New Eyes

"Guilt is really the reverse side of the coin of pride. Guilt aims at self-destruction, and pride aims at the destruction of others."

--Bill W. in *Grapevine*, 1961

When I first cracked open the Big Book, I was not immediately a fan of Bill W.'s writing. What he had to say about you alcoholics struck me as sort of hokey and precious. I had not progressed through many pages, however, before my initial criticisms evaporated. Bill's writing didn't change; this reader did. I fairly

quickly came to the realization that he wasn't talking about you: He was talking directly to me about me. Now I could read these ideas with new eyes.

The section in Chapter 5 leading up to the 4th Step contains several ideas that were brand new to me. Here I was introduced to the truth that my drinking was only a symptom of my real problem, which was—and still is---the self. I also learned about my resentments; which, if you had asked me about one day earlier, I would have claimed to be without. Similarly, I was previously unaware of the corrosive role of fear in my life. Maybe the most remarkable new idea was that I am no different than those I resent; that we all are alike in our spiritual sickness, just flawed people doing our best with where we at spiritually. That idea led me to a new understanding of forgiveness. What I had previously thought was a sort of get-out-of-jail card I may or may not give you depending on how magnanimous I wanted to appear, I now know to be my only reasonable response to an interpersonal conflict.

I've read quite a lot more since those early days, particularly about the self. I really like the quote from Bill at the top of this essay, and its image of the two sides of the same coin. I think of that coin as the currency of self-absorption, and there's only one item I can purchase with it: resentment. If the pride side is up, the resentment is against you. If the guilt side is up, I'm buying a resentment against myself. It's a dangerous coin tossed either way.

Children of Chaos

"With respect to its own affairs, each A.A. group should be responsible to no other authority than its own conscience."

--Tradition Four, Long Form

There's a recurring theme running through AA's steps, traditions and the concepts for service: the movement from chaos to a spiritual solution that provides balance and equilibrium.

In the early days of AA, prior to the adoption of the traditions, new groups formed wherever AA's relocated. It was truly a trial-and-error free-for-all in terms of membership requirements, meeting structure, affiliation with outside entities, and with promotion. For example, one group in Virginia actually served beer at their meetings. They wanted to attract lots of members, and they were focused on keeping people off the "hard stuff." As there were no traditions or guidelines for groups, even they were not disqualified from calling themselves an AA group.

Bill wrote, "...every conceivable deviation...has been tried. That was sure to be, since we are so largely a band of ego-driven individualists. Children of chaos, we have defiantly played with every brand of fire, only to emerge unharmed and, we think, wiser." It seems we, as alcoholics, individually or in groups, are driven to exhaust those ways which do not work before accepting that which clearly does work. Experience has demonstrated that eventually groups will come to rely on the basic principles of their primary purpose—to serve those who still suffer.

This tradition is a testament to AA's great faith in an inspired group conscience. A.A. is so certain of this that each group is regarded as an individual entity governed only by its group conscience, so long as it doesn't affect neighboring groups or A.A. itself. So it is that every group has the right to be wrong.

A.A. Service View

A.A.'s Place in History

The following is excerpted from Slaying the Dragon, The History of Addiction Treatment and Recovery in America by William L. White. This 1998 work is widely used as a textbook for students of addiction treatment counseling.

A.A.'s legacies are many. First, A.A. constitutes the largest and most enduring mutual-aid society of recovered alcoholics in human history. It is the only addiction recovery mutual-aid society that has outlived its founding generation. A.A. also constitutes the most fully developed culture of recovery that has ever existed—a culture with its own history, mythology, values, language, rituals, symbols, and literature. A.A. has also exerted an enormous influence on the evolution of social policies related to alcohol and alcoholism, and on the evolution of alcoholism treatment. This influence is exerted---not institutionally, as A.A. traditions would prohibit---but through the personal advocacy of individual A.A. members whose beliefs about alcoholism and recovery were shaped within A.A. But A.A. has made an even broader contribution to American culture.

Ernest Kurtz believes that A.A. warrants a place in the history of ideas. Believing that "alcoholism replicates the essence of the human condition," Kurtz suggests that A.A.'s refutation of absolute control, its acceptance of limitation, its openness to dependence on resources outside and beyond the self, and its unique healing response to existential shame constitute a benchmark in the modern history of ideas.

Robin Room suggested that A.A. would merit mention in the history of the 20th century, not only for its work with alcoholics, but also for providing a unique organizational model that was "nonhierarchical, non-professionalized and flexible."

A.A. will surely earn a place in the history of social institutions. The birth of A.A. marked the emergence of a new and seemingly enduring form of social affiliation that unfolded within the context of weakening nuclear family structures; decreased contact with extended families and kinship networks; the loss of socially stable, value-homogenous neighborhoods; and the growing impermanence of workplace affiliation. Here in A.A. were groups of people who were not relatives, neighbors, or co-workers; and who represented diverse social, political, and religious backgrounds. They represented different ages, genders, races, sexual orientations, and lifestyles. What bound them together into this association was a shared history of pain, psychological death, and resurrection. And in these small, intimate circles, alcoholics perhaps found an answer to a broader quest shared by alcoholic and non-alcoholic alike: the hunger for the experience of community.

A.A. was the modern beginning of social affiliation based on shared experience. A.A. marks the apex of new voluntary spiritual communities that have increasingly taken over the functions of family, extended family, and neighborhood, as well as the social functions of the church and the workplace. A.A. marks the beginning of voluntary communities defined by psychological and spiritual boundaries rather than by the boundaries of blood, geography, faith, or profession. These voluntary communities are bonded together by what Kurtz has eloquently christened, "the shared honesty of mutual vulnerability openly acknowledged."
